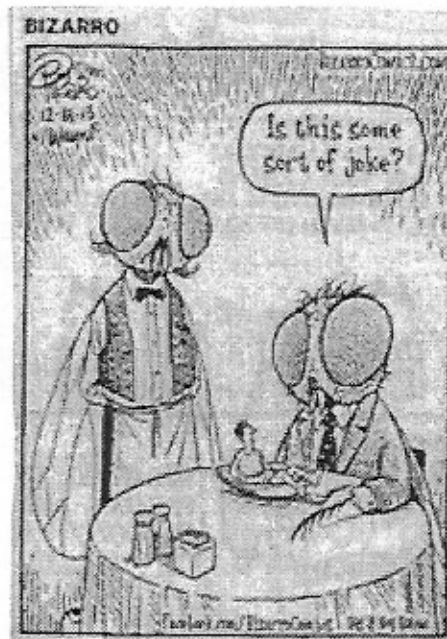

Adventures of Me and My Shadow

As some of you know, I fell while delivering the newspapers not too long ago.

It was about 4:30 in the morning. I was on Highway 36, in Greenleaf, looking for an address to a new customer delivery. I had driven back and forth on the highway about 3 times looking for the address and, fortunately, turned around in the same driveway, causing the resident of the property to become curious. I found the address, pulled up just past it, got out of the car to walk the paper back to the box, stepped on the edge of the asphalt and down I went, into and onto Highway 36. I realized I couldn't physically get up and hoped that a bear, cougar, logger or early to rise fisherman wouldn't be coming down the road real soon. About that time, a man came walking down the driveway that I had turned around in moments earlier. He was carrying a flashlight and a shot gun, not knowing if someone was out casing the neighborhood or not. I started yelling for help. "Help! Help! I've fallen and I can't get up!" God was definitely watching over me that morning. Down the road came my Hero, my Guardian Angel, Darren, who called 911 and my daughter, Alicia, who then called Mark, the ex-paper guy, and my friend Deb who lives in Deadwood. Darren stayed with me the whole time and made sure I did not worry about anything. He even delivered the paper that had flown into the road as I was going down.

Shadow stayed quietly in the car until Darren let him out to see me and let him know I was still alive, although not necessarily okay. He put him back in the car and he waited quietly to be picked up. What a good boy!

Darren's wife, Deanna, brought me a blanket. Darren parked his truck, with lights flashing, in front of me so no one would run over me. The first responders came. Mark showed up, retrieved the newspapers that were left, and finished the route for me. Deb showed up and took Shadow home with her. Darren took my car to his house until Deb and Robert could pick it up the next day, at which time they brought my car and my Shadow home.

I was taken to Peace Health Hospital in Florence where, on Sunday, they did surgery to give me a new hip. I am now back on my route and doing fine.

I cannot thank everyone involved enough for being there for me. I would also like to thank my customers for their patience during my recovery, while my friends and family made sure the paper was delivered to all.

On a positive note, we have seen four herds of elk crossing the road in front of us this month. What an awesome sight.

The old cliché of how we forget the bad and remember the good was especially true of my naval career.

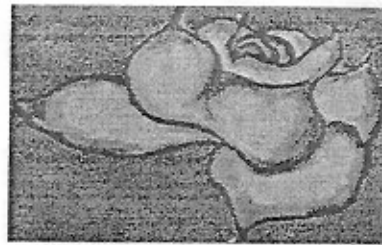

It was told to us that we would encounter a small, friendly native village about half-way in and sure enough we did. When the meal was over, we broke out candy for the kids and cigarettes for the adults. They were elated. Then, out came the musical instruments and the dancing and libations began. An elder came up to me, grabbed my hand and had me show him how to do this peculiar thing. He then went around and showed the villagers how to snap their fingers.

In the morning, we broke camp and went to say our goodbyes. They all came out and walked us to the edge of the village. My final memories of these people was them smiling, saying nothing, both hands in the air, snapping fingers! That was almost 40 years ago, and I still remember it well. It's all about forgetting the bad and thinking about the good.

Bucket List: I'm in the process of contacting friends and relatives throughout the country and having them research roadside attractions in their area. Forget the national parks and monuments. I want to see the world's largest bowling pin, the Oscar Meyer Mobile, a snowcone eating contest and, of course, the world's largest ball of twine! I'll be warm and bubbly all over.
