Fire Department News

Did you know:

- That the Swisshome-Deadwood Fire District does not have SCBA (Self Contained Breathing Apparatus) on our engines as required by the state
- fire engines manufactured before '91 do not have the National Fire Protection Association required tool storage space, enclosed seating, or braking systems and are a potential liability for fire departments
- The Swisshome-Deadwood Fire District took a 1968 engine out of service last year and still has a 1976 and a 1985 engine in service. There are board members who do not want to replace the 1968 engine and doesn't want to replace the 1976 engine
- The Swisshome-Deadwood Fire District has had \$200,000 or more in the Capital Acquisition Fund since 2009 and has received over \$225,000 from State Forestry money since 2008? Historically the money for the Capital Acquisition Fund has come from State Forestry money, not from taxes paid by property owners.

We have more plants to give away!

Thanks to Roseburg Resources Company, we are giving away 1,000 grand fir trees to riparian landowners. We also ordered more from native plant nurseries that are listed below. If you could not select any of these species the first time around, you can now edit your response in the confirmation email that we sent right after you placed the order.

Some of the vine maple, Pacific dogwood and western red cedar will be smaller due to nursery conditions (early and late freezes damaged some of the nursery stock). We will give away the larger plants (18-24 inches tall) to the earliest orders and later orders for these species will be 6-12 inches.

371 spruce 12"+

98 western red cedar 12"+

31 vine maple 6"-12"

125 Pacific dogwood 6"-12"

181 Douglas spirea 12"-18"

30 common camas bulbs

1,000 willow cuttings
