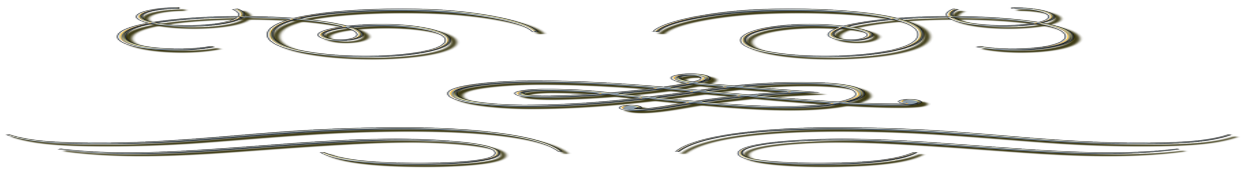

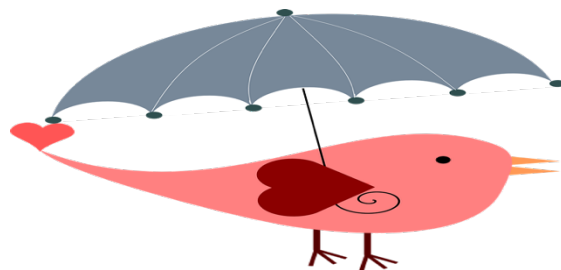
Burned out chasing affirmation on the interwebs, two singer-songwriters from broken-up bands come together to form SMALLTIME.

Slowly fading into a world that we have created, fake food fake people, a world fully automated.

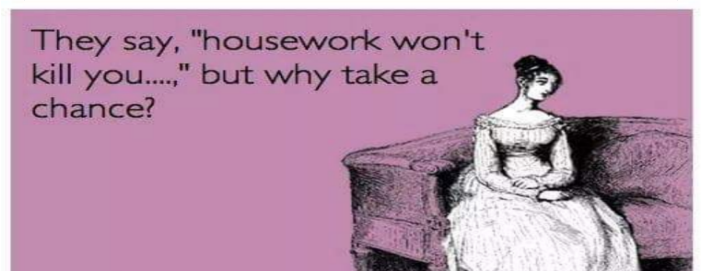
Creatures with so much potential locked behind screens, choosing the easy option, not following their dreams.

New Curmudgeon

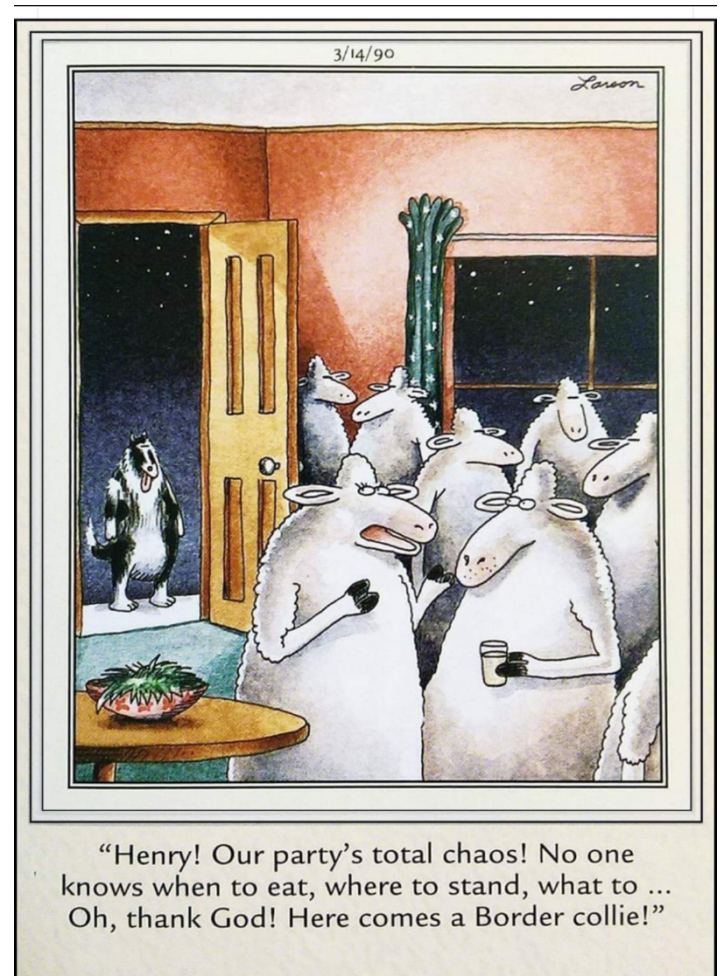
