What if Soil Could Speak ...

It might say "please be gentle." You do not need to till or plow me smooth. You do not need to shovel - just poke a small hole for your plant seed or start. Then surround with mulch for protection and moisture. At harvest do not pull your plant roots out, just snip at their base. Chop up the stalks and leaves (and yes, the weeds too) and lay it all back on your rows. Cover it with compost layers and let my world – the one below your feet - rebuild its nutrients. Please continue to feed and protect with mulch throughout the year.

Grow your soil to Grow your plants!

It's about 4000 miles from earth's core to the soil surface we depend on. That soil layer is typically less than three feet thick. Living soil makes this our planet habitable. Plants and animals die to get reworked into more soil, more plants and animals.

We can build that soil to grow our plants and feed our animals. Mix compost all year long to spread on your garden as plant food. If you spread mulch in early spring your garden might not need watering till July. Spread in early fall to protect your plants from freezing.

Use lots of brown matter – fallen leaves, straw, hardwood chips – to supply carbon. Use green matter – coffee grounds, grass clippings, food waste - (but proportionally less) to supply nitrogen. Read the experts, test the results and experiment with what works. Mixing your own compost brew will work better and be safer than artificial fertilizers. And a lot cheaper.

Spread and watch your compost brew disappear. The soil will settle and turn darker as the organic matter breaks down. The darker the soil the better. Half the decaying matter's carbon will stay in the soil for your plants to eat. Microbes and earthworms will work hard for you given the chance.

CARBON + SOIL = HEALTHY PLANTS

- To feed our plants, the soil must contain carbon.
- Disturbing the soil releases that carbon into the air.
- Cover the Soil to control temperature not too hot, not too cold.
- Cover the Soil with organic material compost or cover crops to rebuild the depleted nutrients that our plants need.
- \cdot Hydrate the soil so water percolates through it not out of it. Encourage microbial life the fungi threads, organic molecules and earthworms have a plan.
- Don't disturb except to feed the biological zoo below the ground. Give them food but don't micromanage. Let them work it out. Bacteria, fungi, algae, protozoa, nematodes and insects have been building soil for millions of years.
- Soil Health = Plant Health = Human Health

The goal of this first article is to start a discussion, provide a place to share information and methods and personal experience. We believe in soil health and know it goes way beyond dirt + water. Composting recipes, microbial inputs, natural fertilizers, natural pesticides - are all chapters (and books) of their own.

The New Curmudgeon

"Neglect not the gift that is within thee.

The poet who is "born and not made" works hard for what you consider their birthright. You have a moral wager to use and develop a talent. We live in eternal uncertainty, knowing only the truth of finitude, struggling to make each new day a new beginning. Soon we will experience the shameless lushness of a new leaf. We hope this relates to the social paradigm as well, the severity of our cultural moment all too discomposing. I am becoming more impressed with the finite smallness of our earthly endeavor as the scale of immensity becomes more apparent. Although the immediate situation seems unbelievably intolerant, it is not even a speck when projected upon the actual scale of being.. There must be an integration and cross-pollination of information effecting integrated wisdom greater than the sum total of bits of fact. Petty disputes between persons of egotistical nature, in sanctimonious piety, sucking the media dry of any real truth, will not cease. But the truth is ever incoherent as we struggle for permanence in a world where permanence is impossible. We are experiencing a phenomenon as much psychological as political. Everybody wants to stay within their comfort zone, spouting out a well rehearsed narrative to justify. Living with a continuous sense of unease identifies something less than fulfilling. Something meaningful is a concept for most people but requires a vision of doing something that matters on a scale beyond the material world. Social media is eating away at our personal identity, making us more vulnerable to depression and anxiety. The inequalities hardwired into our social mores do not let the organization of body and mind be freely developed and not subject to the rule of dogma or enforced designs. Hear the compliant choir's refrains. Possibility is a generator of power and a mobilized mind is the catalyst for informed and inspired action. The social chain is indomitable and the elevation of one individual affects the whole. "Language is not the content of thought but the vessel into which we pour the ambivalences and contradictions of our thinking." Intellect cannot be expressed in numbers. You cannot quantify general intelligence as there is no intellectual unit of measure. The measure of a life's work and purpose is beyond remuneration....there is no equation here. I'm asking (from the Bible) "what shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? "Whew! We must be asking ourselves that question as we confront those who would hide behind the cloak of christianity yet have given their souls to that falsest of gods. Amazing still is that they have devoted followers. Whatever beliefs, values and bits of humanity defines what we mean by "soul", still it is a reference that is universally relevant. We work within that margin of difference afforded us between chance and our personal choices. Children are seeds for life and what grows from them reflects the health of the system from which they were harvested. This is a critical moment for that system. As history, with all its faults, should make clear. They must be able to think for themselves against an ethical background. Modernculture, and especially now, has lost it's reference to ethics and morality. The false sense of connection offered by social media has supplanted human connection with a technical interface. That very interface will be a factor in favor of those who wish to control by force. Being alive is not an easy assignment nowadays. Half the planet seems afire as wars rage and people die horribly, others handcuffed and sent to undisclosed confinements, or worse. All of this must cohere into this weird, weird world in which we must continue our single life. Still the trees blossom and the few remaining birds migrate into an increasingly unfavorable situation.
